Pastor's Fund

During the month of October contributions for the Pastor's Discretionary Fund have been given by: the Family of John "Jack" Blyele, Debi and Randy Lutz, and Pastor Bob.

This fund is used to help area folk in times of need. Your donations are greatly appreciated and may be given to Pastor or mailed to the church, indicated for the Pastor's Fund.

FINANCIAL NEWS

Our non-pass-through expenses from September 26 through October 31 included \$7,589.67 pastor's salary and benefits; \$3,582.74 other salaries on September 30 and October 15 and 31; \$600 to the state and national UCC; \$376.34 insurance; \$362.50 cleaning service; \$322 gas bill; \$300 to the Western Area UCC; \$284.22 copier lease; \$270.50 travel; \$251.38 computer expenses; \$239.33 music copyright license; \$168.71 village utilities; \$172.20 postage; \$125.48 phones; \$106 subscriptions; \$89.90 custodial supplies; and \$80.57 office supplies.

The annual Fall Festival on October 19 netted a \$3,086.35 profit. In keeping with the spirit of tithing, 10 percent of the profit (\$310) was donated to the pastor's discretionary fund to help people in need. Thanks to the organizers and to everyone who worked and donated in any way!

We also thank the members of the Women's Fellowship, who donated \$483 to the church treasury. This represented 15 percent of the profit from their German dinner and Fall Festival bazaar.

2012-13 AND 2013-14 BUDGETS

At the annual meeting a year ago, we passed a 2012-13 budget of \$143,032.74, with a projected deficit of \$11,215.74. We finished the fiscal year on September 30 with actual income of \$135,761.27 and expenditures of \$140,153.38, for an actual deficit of \$4,392.11. We withdrew \$3,000 from savings to cover part of that deficit.

At the annual meeting on October 27, we adopted a 2013-14 budget of \$148,229.52, with a projected deficit of \$15,158.52. Thanks largely to the Fall Festival, we are showing a small surplus for the first month of the new fiscal year.


Congratulations to Kim Comstock and Geoff Morton, who were married in Seattle on September 29.

FYI: Experts on Church Growth tell us (and I would fully agree) that the absolute best way to grow a church is by YOU, the laity, inviting others to attend. During the past year of our congregation's life, we "grew" in our weekly worship attendance from the mid-50's to the low 60's. This represents almost a 20% increase!!

This information is shared, not so our arms can be stretched as we pat ourselves on the back, but rather, for the realization that with God's help, our labors in the fields of God's kingdom in and around Arcade are NOT in vain. We are making a difference for Christ!! May we keep up the good and vital work.

Have you ever been a staff member in a school or church community in which someone has died by suicide? Have you wished there was something you could've done?

Research indicates that 1 person in 20 will have thoughts of suicide in a year. That's 5% of the population. How many people are members of your church? How many people in your first period class?

ASIST is an internationally recognized Evidence-Based Practice designed to teach professionals and non-professionals alike how to recognize suicide risk and what to say and do to keep the person safe until the next level of help can become involved (see: www.livingworks.net).

ASIST provides a practical approach for all caregivers to follow when encountering a suicidal person. Participants learn how: 1) personal attitudes impact suicide intervention, 2) to identify and address suicide risk alerts, 3) to use an effective suicide intervention model, and 4) to network with community resources for a suicide-safer community.

ASIST is open to all community members, including clergy, lay leaders, youth workers, teachers, administrators, and anyone who may be interested (age 16 & over).

THIS WORLD-CLASS WORKSHOP IS AVAILABLE FOR FREE!

This life-changing workshop is sponsored by the New York State Department of Mental Health and includes 2-day interactive training, all participants' materials, a certificate of completion, a Suicide Intervention Handbook, and lunch (at your own expense – or bring your lunch). ASIST is open to those 16 and over; those 18 and under require parental permission.

The registration fee is \$10/person. If you are interested in attending, let Pastor Bob know and your registration fee will be covered! And we can car pool.



Stewardship Scoop: Adam's Lesson

How many times have we heard it said that stewardship is the giving of one's time, talents and financial support? Stewardship is the life blood of any functioning church and its missions. Each year churches across the world give much attention studying how to inspire their members collectively to be the best stewards they can be. Is building disciples and creating stewards really all that different? Both align closely with how we as individuals see ourselves in our personal faith journeys. For most Christians, alignment to a church is the primary medium for expressing their principal stewardship efforts.

Would you agree that your connection to a church helps to inspire your own stewardship? The more connected we feel to a church, the more inspired we are to support its stewardship needs. Recognition of that fact offers much towards inspiring congregations to be good stewards. As we study what we need in a church, we should also examine what a church needs from us and, equally important, what the needs of others might be. When we watch out for each other we remind them how important they are to us and to the healthy life of a church. We cannot achieve as much singularly as we can when we inspire others, even others who might think differently than us, to join us in service to the church's missions. As we continue to study our own church giving, perhaps we need to also study how our efforts drive missions. Do those efforts, through our inclusion and empowerment of others, insure that the missions we partake in grow to be self-sustaining even after we re-direct to new missions and faith callings?

The best way to feel a part of anything is through inclusiveness. Inclusiveness is a gift we give to others. Anyone remember when they were a kid being picked last for a sports team? Staying with the sports analogy, did the bench warmers among us ever get to fully connect with their respective team? A dear friend and church member recently relayed a quote to me. **"Use**

what talents you possess. The woods would be very silent if no birds sang there except those who sang best". Similarly a church comes fully alive when others are enlisted into all aspects of its missions. Any good mission starts with an idea, develops through good leadership but only sustains itself when it becomes a defining mission of a collective group. Perhaps it's time to give an example we can relate to of someone placing the mission and others in front of their own needs and wants. Does anyone actually think that Pastor Bob got tired of playing the bass for Far Cry? Pastor Bob set aside his own desires and personal fulfillment Far Cry provided him to encourage that "his spot" be filled by the next generation of talent. Thank you, Pastor, for showing us this example of unselfish love of another. You didn't wait for this young man to ask, but rather encouraged it to occur in growing a mission.

I believe that personal stewardship is at its best when we walk with others and others inspire us to walk with them versus just following where led. This church needs us all. Young and old alike are important and needed for the success of a church. You are needed and can inspire others in their own stewardship growth through actions fueled by a love for others and consciously focusing on what might serve to make others feel included. It's the old "Give and you shall receive" working at its best.

On the occasion of a recent fund raiser, one of the youngest in our midst gave me a "peek" at discipleship at its best. I have NEVER seen a young person any more excited than I did recently when Adam Romance squealed with excitement when he learned that he had won the basket he wanted at a benefit auction. His smile went ear-to-ear, as he jumped for joy. But what made my own heart smile was recognizing that Adam wasn't just happy for himself but he was happy for his Dad whom he was about to give the basket away to. Thank you Adam (and Pastor Bob), for reminding us that we are at our best when others are placed before our own needs and desires.

Are others being encouraged to continue the missions near and dear to your heart through inclusiveness, mentoring and empowerment or are those missions likely to stutter and falter without you? Likewise are you being encouraged to partake in new-to-you missions?

Even the last kid picked brings something to the game and does much in the building of a team. My perfect mission team would be one made up of all Adams.
